Getting to know our new Bishop of Auckland Bishop Stephen Lowe (Bishop Steve)

Bishop Stephen Marmion Lowe, was appointed Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Auckland on 18 December 2021. He was appointed following the retirement of Bishop Patrick Dunn (due to his ongoing eyesight issues).

Bishop Steve is also the Apostolic Administrator of Hamilton until the Pope appoints a new bishop for the Hamilton diocese.

Bishop Steve Lowe is familiar with Marist Catholic School Herne Bay as he previously served as Formation Director at Holy Cross Seminary from 2008 until the end of 2014. While based at the Seminary in Auckland, he served, for a time, as the Parish Priest at the Sacred Heart Parish, Ponsonby and used to visit Marist Catholic School regularly.

NZ Sign Language Week (NZSL Week for short)



New Zealand Sign Language is not British Sign Language or American Sign Language it is completely New Zealand. To celebrate it, our Cultural Leaders and other Year 6 students organised some activities and games at lunchtime in the classrooms. Even though they were in different classes each day anyone could come from any class.

On Monday the first activity was in Austin. We made posters about sign language. The younger children especially, were really good with making posters and listened really well. One or two of them even learned how to spell their name! Afterwards we left some posters in Austin for them to hang up.

On Tuesday we were in Bernard. Again we made posters with the younger children. We also learnt a song together in sign language.

On Wednesday in Cleary, we had a competition where we showed everyone a few words in Sign Language like: dad, mum, sister, love. Then we asked them what each word was in Sign Language and the first person to get it right would get a point. At the end, the person with the most points won a prize.

On Thursday in Chavoin, we showed everyone some Sign Language and played a game.

Friday or 'Friyay' as some people like to call it, we were in Chavoin again. We showed everyone some more words

in Sign Language and played some more games.



In our classes throughout the week we learnt the alphabet in Sign Language. We learnt how to say 'My name' and then we spelt out our full name, in Sign Language!

We had a really fun NZSL week and thank all the Year 6 students for helping everyone learn some great sign language words and games. We look forward to seeing NZSL being used throughout the year.
