Year 6 Camp:


On Tuesday the 20th of September, the Year 6's went to MERC in Long Bay for their camp. MERC stands for Marine Education Recreation Centre.

We got to camp at about 12pm on Tuesday and sat down to eat our packed lunches. Once everyone arrived we went into the main hall for one of the MERC instructors to tell us about the rules, expectations and how to keep safe at the camp. Next we played a few games and after that we went onto two giant paddle boards in our teams (team Tahi was green and team Rua was orange) and the instructors showed us some water safety. That evening we had a quiz which was very fun after a dinner of burgers and fries.

On Wednesday we woke up to the sound of the waves crashing down on the beach and the birds tweeting up in the trees. We got out of bed and went for a beach walk before our breakfast which was cereal, hash browns, eggs, toast and bacon. We washed our dishes after breakfast, then team Tahi did abseiling and team Rua did water sailing. Abseiling at MERC is where you have ropes

tied tightly around your waist and you walk down a steep blue wall, with the MERC instructors at the top and bottom holding the ropes tightly. Sailing is where we had two boats, one green and one yellow, and we learnt to put up the mast on the beach, push the boat out into the water, detach the trailer, and then jump back onto the boat and sail away. Team Tahi even saw an Orca when they were out sailing! We finished the day with a lovely Mass, in front of the big windows that overlooked the beautiful sea. Thank you Father Rory and some of our parents for coming to celebrate Mass with us at Camp!

On Thursday we got up and again went for a walk on the beach before breakfast. That day we did canoeing and rock climbing. For canoeing, we tied three canoes together, jumped on board and paddled out to sea. In the canoes, we paddled over a reef and some students saw some fish! We also did rock climbing, where we had three people as anchors and they pulled up the person climbing. It was so much fun! After dinner we had a talent show with some of the boys from one of the groups winning with a funny skit. It was a great night. For dinner that night we had spaghetti bolognese.





underneath a kayak in the sand, and then getting our whole team under the kayak and up to the other side. Team tahi won this contest. We also had to jump on our giant paddle boards, one team on each board and then paddle around a blue boat and five floats that were in the water. Then we had to paddle back to the finish line. Team Rua won this second contest. For the last content, we had to use the giant paddle boards to paddle out to the blue boat, get our whole team on the blue boat then each person had to do the seal dive backwards off the paddle board. We then had to swim to the big hexagon float, crawl across to the 4 rectangle floats then jump back on the giant paddle board and paddle back to the finish line. Team Rua won that final contest so they won the overall MERC Games Championships. The MERC instructions then taught us how to make a fire using a steel and metal flint. We went and collected cabbage tree leaves and used those to make the fire. We placed a piece of cotton inside our stack of wood and cabbage tree leaves and set the piece of cotton on fire using the flint and steel. We were then allowed to roast marshmallows in the fire.

After lunch it was sadly time to say goodbye to all of the MERC instructors before leaving the camp. Camp was so much fun. Thank you to all the parent helpers, teachers and MERC instructors for organising such a great camp trip for the Year 6 students.

parents. She believes strongly in being an active and uplifting




Simon Morgan:

First we made a **Define Map** to create a common understanding of what a Kaitiaki is, and what our role is as a Kaitiaki.


This is our definition:

A kaitiaki is a person or a group that takes care of the earth. Kaitiaki are the guardians and

protectors of our environment. The original guardians were the Māori gods, e.g. Tāne-mahuta is the god of the forest.

Our next big question was, 'How much water covers the Earth's surface?' We had fun using our probability skills to work out the percentage. We threw the globe 100 hundred times. Our results were close, we got 72%. The Earth's surface is covered by 71% water.



What is a watershed?

Next we learnt about the term 'Watershed'. A watershed is an area of land in which all water flows down into a common basin. The water collects to form rivers, lakes, streams or bays.

We built our own watersheds using newspapers and rubbish

bags. We poured water into our watersheds to track the movement of the water with dye and glitter.
